Child Rights Advocacy at UNICEF Switzerland and Liechtenstein

The UN predicts that two third of the world's population will be living in urban areas by 2035. Extreme population growth, densification and global warming lead to changing social and cultural patterns and behaviors, which pose multiple challenges to the implementation of child friendly living spaces. Children are part of our society and have particular needs, interests and desires in regard to their direct living environments. The planning and design of living spaces and urban areas strongly influences and impacts children's lives and development. Child friendly living spaces do not only refer to spaces explicitly designated to children, such as playgrounds, but to all spaces: Residential areas, school routes, childcare facilities, cycle paths, public spaces and streets and many more. Children and young people are experts in their own matters. Through participatory planning and design processes that actively involve children, we ensure urban development that is based on the needs of the target group. Sustainable urban development that provides children and young people with the necessary safety and independent mobility that is important for their development must therefore take place in dialogue with children and young people.

Keynote by Natalie Davet - Breaking the "Intergenerational Silence": a Step Forward on Building Intergenerational Cohesion

Current demographic trends demand progressive political solutions to avoid societies with escalating generational conflicts because of increased inequity between generations, increased dependency (Bengtson & Oyama 2007) or intensified ageism (Bytheway 2005). The problem of age segregation can also be accounted for by concerns regarding the economic and political implications of an ageing society in which there is a consequent need for greater social and economic solidarity between generations (Fitzpatrick 2020). Intergenerational interventions, such as joint cultural activities, intergenerational education and learning, multigenerational housing options, community building or other initiatives, has in recent years become an increasingly well-established ideal in many societies around the globe (Davet 2020; Kaplan et al 2020). Despite being perceived as challenging to arrange in practice, the intergenerational idea is embraced both in research and practice as something universally good that benefits "all people". Intergenerational interventions therefore appear to be something that society should fruitfully engage in, but rather avoids because it is demanding and time consuming.

My presentation is based on extensive ethnographic fieldwork combined with policy analysis and it focuses on how intergenerational ambitions runs the risk of reinforcing monogenerational divisions, if not considered and dealt with as a comprehensive political and social concern. By uncovering some of the hidden barriers of intergenerational interventions in the case of Sweden, I will discuss how a permeating "intergenerational silence" become a way of representing and reproducing the actual problem construct of age-segregation.




